Anthropology 738 - Archaeology as History

The course examines the goals, forms, theory and methods of archaeological history. It considers parallels, contrasts and complementarities in historical and archaeological perspectives, and identifies the specific limitations and possibilities of archaeology. Readings and discussion highlight the roles of structure, agency, contingency and causality in archaeological narratives, and the implications of time perspectivism, materiality, and relational understandings of historical phenomena. Beyond its theoretical foundations, the course looks at examples of historically oriented archaeology and encourages students to examine and develop applications that match their specific areas of research interest.

Readings and discussions consider the basis and practice of archaeology-based history. The course begins with a brief overview of historical perspectives and foundational theoretical perspectives. The second half will focus on elaborations on particular topics and applications of historically oriented approaches in archaeological research.
