### **Course description**

This course examines current research in anthropological approaches to the study of Islamic beliefs, practices, and communities. Topics include the relationships of Islamic belief and practice to gender roles, economic forces, capitalist consumption, and religious conversion.

### Course assignments and evaluation:

Students should come to class prepared to discuss in-depth each week's readings. Participation constitutes 50% of the course grade.

In addition, ten weekly "reading responses" are required. Reading responses should: (1) provide a concise statement summarizing that week's chapters (approximately two to three paragraphs); (2) evaluate critically the reading; and/or (3) relate points raised by the reading to other course readings. *I encourage you to find and read book reviews of the texts listed below and consider responding to and/or building upon issues raised by reviewers*. Reading response papers should be approximately three to four pages long; they constitute a total of 50% of the course mark.
