## **Course Description**

An examination of the variety of ways in which physical death and the afterlife were understood in biblical and post-biblical Judaism as well as in the New Testament and early Christianity.

Among the topics to be considered are the netherworld, immortality and resurrection, as well as the relationship of these concepts to issues of faith and morality.

## **Course Objectives**

By the end of this course students will have:

- Encountered the diverse representations of death and the afterlife in biblical, post-biblical and cognate texts available in English translation;
- Recognized the challenges of reconstructing historical situations from the interpretation of ancient materials;
- Reflected on the ways early Jewish and early Christian concepts continue to inform and to challenge contemporary discourse.

## **Required Materials and Texts**

As noted in the calendar below. All readings are available electronically through McMaster library or Avenue to Learn. The focus will be on English translations of ancient texts both canonical and non-canonical.

**Attendance is mandatory in this course**. You cannot participate and engage if you are not present (in every sense of the word).
